


While 7 years does not reach quite back to the *Byzantine* Era, it is a significant amount of time (and agendas).

Even though we didn't get to view the entire meeting, David was able to show us a few items of the Auction/raffle tables before the technical difficulties shut us down. We were stifled for a moment or two, then OK we're all here let's talk a little more about ourselves and Glass. We learned this was Glenn's first meeting with the club, although he's been a member for several years and attends all our annual glass shows. He thoroughly enjoyed our talk and explained to us a little bit about his collection, one of which is Bubble Girl, but he doesn't know the manufacturer. Neil thought the champagne was made by Central Glass Company. Next Mary Kreitling talked a little bit about her vast collections, Fostoria, Kitchenware and even non-glass, Steiff Bears. She mentioned in a one-time cruise around her house she counted she had collected at least a piece of glassware from 30 different glass manufacturers. "I'm not a purist" was her next comment. The sharing of her knowledge of glassware was very enjoyable. Of course, our photographer and historian, Neil and Eddie Unger, members for 40+ years, talked about their diverse and vast collections. explained a little bit about her collections and how she got started collecting. A Salt & Pepper shaker collection was given to her...they were not even glass. This was the start, on to glass shakers, then on and on, eventually to Fairy Lamps. Neil explained about his collections and how he got started. As always Neil's talk was very colorful and informative...from his likes to dollar values to emerging trends. Sally Cousineau then talked about her collection of Viking, which is very popular now with the Mid-Century Modern boom and how she got started with the Viking collection, because of Neil Unger. I explained how I got started in my collection of Imperial's Candlewick and the forty plus years as a club member. Finally, Greg Greenwald and Scott Knutson gave us history on their collection of Cambridge's Rosepoint. They are purists and I quote, "we will not collect anything else until we have a complete set of Rosepoint."


Sorry for the ZOOM disaster at the meeting. Your tech un-savvy editor
