


THE SOCIETY Prepares for Autumn


yes, I would have walked off with them!! Mary Sue Lyon's dark

... Prez and VEEP continues

This Summer, the **NDGA** (not the North Dakota Golf Association, nor the Nigerian Dwarf Goat Association, but the National Depression Glass Association) held its annual convention in **Tiffin**, **Ohio**. There were 14 members of our Society present as dealers, buyers, or displayers. It was great seeing friends there and sharing our purchases—some people bought so much, that they had to ask others to transport their glassware back to the Chicagoland area, and no, it was not Kathy or me.

Additionally, Kathy and I went to the **Phoenix Consolidated Glass Collectors' Club convention in Pittsburgh, PA**. One of the highlights was going into Pittsburgh to the **Heinz History Center**, a family of museums with displays about the growth of the United States beyond the Allegheny Mountains. Pittsburgh is credited as the Glass Capital of the U. S. because of its rich source of the natural materials needed to make and sell glass. One of their displays was on the role of women in the development and growth of our country, from fashion to steel to glass. In the glass display was a tribute to the women artists who decorated, etched and cut, cleaned and shipped glassware from the many glass manufacturing companies located from Pittsburgh west to Chicago and out to San Francisco. We have tentatively planned for a presentation to The Society by **Anne Madarasz, the Director of Curatorial Division**, Chief Historian at the Heinz History Center, and the author of the book, **Shattering Notions**, a history of the glass industry in Pittsburgh from its beginning up to the present. Anne lectures and writes frequently on the subject of Pittsburgh glass, regional industry, and the history of Pittsburgh sports. Anne has served as the project director or curator for five exhibitions that have received the national Award of Merit from the American Association for State and Local History.

Kathy and I would like to give a BIG round of applause to our Board of Directors and the elected officers for the 20-30 -40 Society. They have been willing to step up and tackle several tasks that have been neglected for a number of years. We now have an up-to-date and membership-approved set of By-laws to govern the Society operations. We are in the process of rewriting the Job Descriptions for each elected officer and for the committee chairmen, so if you are asked to serve, you will know what is expected of you. We have a new venue for our show for 2025, and you should be expecting a phone call from us, asking you to volunteer to assist us in managing the various tasks associated with running a high quality antique show. We cannot do this show without your help. **Silvano Brugioni** has been diligently working on the show, as well as recruiting dealers from across the country to participate in our event in March of 2025. If you have any friends who are dealers in this area or from out of state, please contact them to ask if they are interested in dealing, and then let Silvano know who they are. Everyone should have a digital directory of members, so if you need to contact anyone with questions or information, please call or text or email—we will answer.


